Getting around

We're lucky to have some fabulous local attractions right on our doorstep; some are within walking distance and others are just a short drive or bus ride away.

If you'd like to take advantage of public transport, there is a bus stop just at the end of the lane (Pont Dulas, City Dulas).

The 62 bus stops here and travels between Bangor and Cemaes regularly throughout the day. We recommend using the Traveline Cymru Journey Planner or Google Maps for the most up to date bus times.

Beaches

Lligwy Beach

A wide, sandy beach located just around the corner from the village of Moelfre, Lligwy Beach is perfect for long walks, sunbathing and wave watching.



You can either plonk yourself on the beach and let that feeling of calm wash over you, or head off along the Anglesey Coastal Path to spot ancient geology, rare wildflowers and enough birdlife to get Chris Packham's binoculars in a twist.

Even on peak summer days, there's enough space to dawdle and sunbathe for endless hours, admiring those tiny Common Blue butterflies: nowhere does big spaces quite like Anglesey.

There's a cafe and toilets, but opening times can vary depending on the season. Be sure to take cash or a card for the car park - it has number plate recognition...

Distance from Dulas Meadow: 7 minutes by car

Beaches

Traeth yr Ora "Secret Beach"

Want to feel like you've got your very own private beach? Traeth yr Ora is just far enough off the beaten track to truly be one of Anglesey's hidden gems...



Traeth yr Ora was recently crowned the UK's Most Secluded Beach. It's cut off from the summer crowds by a headland at each end and you can only really get there by foot (or by boat!) so it does take a little bit more work to get there, but it's SO WORTH IT!

There's no parking, toilets or refreshments nearby, so come prepared and be sure to check the tide times before you set off.

Distance from Dulas Meadow: approx 50 minutes on foot

Beaches

Traeth Bychan

Located between Benllech and Moelfre, this safe, sandy bay is backed by cliffs, so is sheltered from the southwesterly winds.



The location of this beach is perfect for walkers of the coastal path, those who enjoy sailing and watersports or even just if you wish to have a chilled beach day. At high tide, the beach splits into two contrasting areas, a busier sandy side to the north and a quiet, secluded pebble beach to the south.

There is a café that offers some great food and drinks, even a cold beer on a hot summer's day and of course nice toilets (always important!) are in the pay and display car park.

Distance from Dulas Meadow: 9 minutes by car

Beaches

Porth Eilian

Porth Eilian is another hidden gem that we've recommended to several campers and it always gets the seal of approval!



Come rain or shine, this is a beautiful place to spend an afternoon!

Set on the north-eastern tip of Anglesey, this is a small bay that's popular for water sports, including sailing, kayaking and paddle boards. There are toilets and parking is a short walk from the beach.

Distance from Dulas Meadow: 12 minutes by car

Villages

Moelfre

A picture-perfect seaside town, Moelfre is one of Anglesey's most popular holiday destinations. With beautiful coastal views, two little beaches and plenty of cafes and pubs, we understand why!



Moelfre is an ideal starting point for the Anglesey Coastal Path; you can walk between the South and North beaches, taking in the stunning sea views.

The village is home to Moelfre Lifeboat Station and Moelfre Seawatch Centre, where you can learn all about Moelfre's rich maritime and lifeboat history.

The South beach is particularly popular for activities, including canoeing, kayaking and paddle boarding, so bring your wetsuit!

**Distance from Dulas Meadow: 8 minutes by car,
18 minutes by bus**

Villages

Cemaes Bay

The most northerly village in Wales, Cemaes boasts a pretty harbour and two beaches.



The beaches and rocks around Cemaes are popular for fishing and you can even go crabbing off the end of the quay.

Like many of the coastal spots around Anglesey, Cemaes is popular with sailing and water sports enthusiasts and you'll likely spot kayaks, dinghys and sailing boats exploring the bay.

**Distance from Dulas Meadow: 19 minutes by car,
38 minutes by bus**

Landmarks

Penmon Point & Penmon Lighthouse



Penmon Point has incredible views and is a popular location for fishermen, birdwatchers and walkers. The currents are strong, so swimming isn't recommended. Instead, take in the views, explore the rock pools and keep an eye out for puffins, seals and dolphins!

To the east is Penmon Lighthouse, which was built in 1838. You can access the lighthouse via a small causeway on a very low tide, but be careful; it can be extremely slippery, so you may prefer to just admire it from a distance!

There is a cafe, the Pilot House, which offers a selection of hot and cold snacks, specialty coffees and Welsh cream teas.

Distance from Dulas Meadow: 39 minutes by car

Landmarks

Amlwch Creek



Amlwch Creek is a beautiful hidden gem on the outskirts of Amlwch. It's small but definitely worth a visit! During the summer months the pristine blue waters look like you could be in the Caribbean! Our sons also enjoy a cold water dip here in the winter, which is not for the faint-hearted!

This is a special spot favoured by locals, so we do ask that all visitors are respectful, mindful of noise and ensure that they take any litter away with them.

There is a car park nearby; from here, it's a short walk to the creek, with a handrail and steps leading down to the beach.

Distance from Dulas Meadow: 12 minutes by car

Food & Drink

The Pilot Boat



The Pilot Boat is our nearest pub, located a short walk, or even shorter drive from Dulas Meadow!

Serving up traditional pub grub, it also has a beer garden, is dog-friendly and is an excellent starting or finishing point for a number of local walking routes!

Distance from Dulas Meadow: 3 minutes by car, 15-20 minutes on foot (depending how fast you walk!)

Food & Drink

The Oystercatcher



Situated in Rhosneigr, just a short walk from the beach, The Oystercatcher is a well-known dining spot amongst locals and tourists. The site actually boasts the main restaurant - The Oystercatcher, a trendy cocktail bar - Will's Bar, a takeaway shack - Pat's Shack AND an outdoor caravan bar - Dune Bar, so it certainly offers something for everyone! They even have a doggy menu!

Booking is recommended for the main restaurant.

Distance from Dulas Meadow: 27 minutes by car

Food & Drink

The Kinmel Arms



Sitting at the base of Moelfre village, with great views of the bay, this is one that we visit often. Another dog-friendly one, they normally have treats and ice cream available for dogs.

They do a great curry night in the winter months and, in spring and summer there is beer garden that serves traditional stone baked pizzas and often hosts live music events.

Distance from Dulas Meadow: 8 minutes by car, 19 minutes by bus

Food & Drink

The Ring



The Ring is a traditional country pub in the rural village of Rhosgoch. Having been open as a pub since 1851, The Ring is a firm favourite in the local community and is well known for its warm and friendly atmosphere.

The menu features a selection of fresh local seasonal food and accompanies the well stocked bar. Their Sunday roasts are especially popular! Booking recommended.

Distance from Dulas Meadow: 12 minutes by car
